



PECKHAM'S RANGE UNIT

THE MINISTRY OF FORESTS IS ACTIVELY RESTORING THE PECKHAM'S RANGE UNIT NEAR FORT STEELE FOR LIVESTOCK GRAZING. INITIALLY TRANSFORMED IN THE 1960S AND 1980S, THIS 100-HECTARE RANGE UNIT, VITAL FOR GRAZING UNGULATES AND LIVESTOCK AND A POPULAR RECREATION SITE, HAS EXPERIENCED DECLINING PRODUCTIVITY DUE TO INVASIVE PLANTS AND MANAGEMENT CHALLENGES. **ENGAGED IN THIS PROJECT SINCE 2019**, EKISC CONTINUED TREATMENTS AND MONITORING THIS YEAR, EAGERLY ANTICIPATING THE ONGOING REVITALIZATION.



WYCLIFFE CONSERVATION COMPLEX

YEAR 4 OF THE WYCLIFFE CONSERVATION COMPLEX PROJECT IS NOW FINISHED, SAFEGAURDING SEVERAL SPECIES AT RISK AND ECOLOGICALLY CRUCIAL GRASSLANDS AND DRY, OPEN FOREST HABITATS IN THE SOUTHERN ROCKY MOUNTAIN TRENCH. THIS COLLABORATIVE PROJECT INVOLVES THE PROVINCE, THE NATURE CONSERVANCY OF CANADA, AND THE NATURE TRUST OF BC. OUR EFFORTS THIS YEAR INCLUDED TREATMENTS IN PRIORITIZED AREAS, FOLLOWED BY EFFECTIVENESS MONITORING.



GALTON RANGE INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT

WE'VE COMPLETED THE **FIRST YEAR** OF THE GALTON RANGE INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT PROJECT, UNITING **7 LAND MANAGERS AND FUNDERS** TO ADDRESS INVASIVE SPECIES ACROSS THE LANDSCAPE. THE PROJECT FOCUSES ON REDUCING INVASIVE SPECIES IN VALUABLE WILDLIFE HABITAT THROUGH TREATMENTS, OUTREACH, AND EDUCATION. THE INITIAL SEASON INVOLVED **SURVEYING**, **TREATMENTS**, AND **MONITORING**, AND WE'RE ENTHUSIASTIC ABOUT THE PROJECT'S FUTURE IMPACT.



GREP - RANGE TENURE INVASIVE PLANT CONTROL PROGRAM

EKISC PLAYS A KEY ROLE IN OVERSEEING ONE OF THE GRASSLAND AND RANGELAND ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM'S FUNDED PROJECTS CALLED THE **EAST KOOTENAY RANGE TENURE INVASIVE PLANT CONTROL PROGRAM**, WHICH OFFERS FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO RANCHERS FOR IMPLEMENTING INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT ON THEIR RANGE TENURES. THE PROGRAM AIMS TO PREVENT NEW INTRODUCTIONS, DIMINISH EXISTING INFESTATIONS, AND ENHANCE FORAGE AVAILABILITY. WE PROUDLY MARK OUR **11TH YEAR** AS PARTICIPANTS IN THIS INITIATIVE, AND DURING THE 2023 SEASON, WE COLLABORATED WITH **6 DEDICATED RANCHER-SPRAYERS**.



UPPER ELK VALLEY INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT PLAN

EKISC COMPLETED YEAR 4 OF THE UPPER ELK VALLEY INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT PLAN DESPITE CHALLENGES FROM ELK VALLEY WILDFIRES, WHICH LED TO ROAD CLOSURES AFFECTING TREATMENT COVERAGE. THE PROJECT AIMS TO CURB THE INTRODUCTION AND SPREAD OF INVASIVE SPECIES IN VITAL WILDLIFE HABITATS, FOCUSING ON BIGHORN SHEEP AREAS. IN THE EFFORT, 53.98 HA WERE TREATED IN CONSERVATION PROPERTIES, RECREATION TRAILS, AND FOREST SERVICE ROADS, ALONGSIDE ONGOING PLOT MONITORING AND EDUCATIONAL OUTREACH.
